The Annual Report, Accounts and Balance Sheet for 1947.

THE OBJECTS OF THE ASSOCIATION, &c.

The Association of British Members of the Swiss Alpine Club was founded in 1909, with the main object of encouraging climbers and walkers in this country to join that Club. The S.A.C. (to give it its usual abbreviation) is nearly as old as the Alpine Club itself, and for over half a century has gone on steadily with its work of making the Alps accessible to climbers and others, in particular by building the 90 or more Club Huts which now exist. Before this Association came into being there had been many British members of the Club. But these were the exceptions rather than the rule, partly because the average British climber had no idea how to join, and partly because it did not occur to him that there was any point in doing so. But among those who were members, there were some who felt that such a state of affairs ought not to continue; that if our climbers used the huts, they should do something to help to maintain them, and that by some means it should be made easy to join the S.A.C. The energy of the late Mr. J. A. B. Bruce created a strong Committee, which undertook this matter and brought this Association into being under the late Mr. Clinton Dent as President. Within two years of the start there were 300 members and their number has continued to grow. The result of our activities is that the proportion of our countrymen who climb in the Alps and are now members of the S.A.C. is very large, and most of them are also members of this Association.

At the same time it was felt that there was need for a rallying point over here for these "clubists," and as it is not possible, by the rules of the S.A.C., for a section to be formed outside Switzerland, as was the case with the D.Oe.A.V. (which had a section at Manchester at one time), the Association acquired a room in which its members could meet together, and took upon itself something of the functions of a Club. All these arrangements were only undertaken after consultation with the Central Committee of the S.A.C., and the latter cordially welcomed the enterprise. In addition, as it was felt that we British climbers owed Switzerland something for past remissness, the fund to build the Britannia Hut was started and the building successfully carried through by 1912.

The Association has been able, in many ways, to co-operate with our Swiss colleagues, and at times to represent to them our views on mountaineering matters. On the other hand, the Central Committee has always looked on us with the greatest favour and has dealt very cordially with anything we have put before it.

The number of members is now 568 and an analysis of the list of members shows their distribution among the various sections to be as follows:—

The membership of the Swiss Alpine Club itself is now over 30,000 in about 80 sections.

#### NEW MEMBERS.

165 new members have joined during the past year, but 26 have resigned or died. It is hoped that members will make every effort to secure *new candidates* for the Association.

Of these, 80 are Life Members, 6 Honorary Members, 400 Ordinary Members, and 82 on the Retired List.

#### PROGRESS OF THE ASSOCIATION.

Beginning with 26 Members in 1909 the membership rapidly rose until the first World War, when there was naturally a falling off; but from 1920 onwards the numbers rose again to over 700, when the financial crisis of 1931 hit the tourist industry in Switzerland very badly. The depreciation of the Pound kept the younger men away from the Alps to a noticeable extent, though by the summer of 1939 an improvement was beginning to show.

The Second World War naturally brought a heavy slump, and the numbers fell to below 400. With the re-opening of the Alps however in 1946, new members again began to come in at a very satisfactory rate, and quite a number of old ones rejoined. 1947 brought in a record number of new members, many of them being from Scotland and the north of England; but the Ban on Foreign Travel is certain to have a very serious effect on our numbers if it is not lifted during the coming summer.

# THE ADVANTAGES OF BELONGING TO THE SWISS ALPINE CLUB.

Quite apart from the sentimental feeling that a member of the S.A.C. is helping mountaineers in the country in which he is a guest to add to the amenities of the sport, the definite material advantages are set out below.

#### RIGHTS IN THE S.A.C. HUTS.

Members of the Club, together with their wives, have priority of right to the sleeping places and in many huts there is a room for members only; next after members comes the ladies' Swiss Club, and then the kindred clubs, such as the French A.C. Anyone else is really in a club hut on sufferance. In addition a member pays, in most huts, only I franc per night, and a non-member 3 francs. Those who intend to climb have priority over others in the same category. A member may introduce his wife and children (under 20 years of age) on the same terms as himself. Members are entitled to use any S.A.C. Hut regardless of what Section they may belong to.

It is worth remembering, in connection with projected visits to huts that while a Section may reserve a hut for its members to the extent of three-quarters of its capacity only, one-quarter is always available for others of the S.A.C. It is generally worth the trouble before going to a hut to ascertain from a local hotel-keeper whether a hut is so reserved, and if it is, to go up there early in the day. As a rule these reservations may not be made on Saturdays and Sundays. It is when one comes down to a hut on a day when it has been reserved, that the advantages of

membership are most precious.

A few of the huts in Switzerland do not belong to the S.A.C., but as a rule these are run in close alliance with that Club and the special regulations make little difference to members of the S.A.C.

#### REDUCTIONS ON RAILWAYS.

But the matter which, perhaps, makes the greatest appeal to many people is the advantages due to the large reductions made to members on the mountain railways

(except in the Engadine). In taking a holiday in some districts a member saves, in these reductions, considerably more than his subscription to the Club.

For convenience we publish the official list of the reductions, somewhat abbreviated, from "Die Alpen," February, 1947.

These reductions, as a rule, apply only to a member, and do not include his wife and children.

- 50% Aigle-Leysin; Arth-Rigi; Brunnen-Morschach-Axenstein; Furka-Oberalp; Gerschnialp (33% only on return tickets and no reduction on the descent); Gornergrat; Interlaken-Heimwehfluh; Martigny-Châtelard; Ritom; Visp-Zermatt.
- 40% Aigle-Sépey-Diablerets; Monthey-Champéry-Morgins; Montreux-Glion, Territet-Glion, and Glion-Rochers de Naye (no reduction on intermediate stages); Sierre-Montana-Vermala.
- 30% Jungfrau; Leukerbad; Niesen; Nyon-St. Cergue-Morez; Schwyz-Stoos Drahtseilbahn.
- 25% Berner Oberland; Bex-Villars-Bretaye (Chamossaire); Lauterbrunnen Murren Allmendhubel (Seilbahn); Muottas-Muraigl; Schynige Platte; Wengernalp.
- 20% Beckenried-Klewenalp (Luftseilbahn); Braunwald; Brienz-Rothorn-Bahn; Pilatus; Säntis-Schwebebahn; Stanserhorn; Lake of Thun to Beatenberg.

There are also minor reductions in connection with motor-cars in one or two places.

To obtain these reductions it is absolutely necessary to present the card of membership when booking.

It is worth noting that the reductions are mostly available to members of the corresponding Ladies' Swiss Alpine Club, so that the old feminine grievance that only the men got any reductions is now a thing of the past, if ladies will join their Swiss Club. In this connection, the Hon. Secretaries may be able to advise members how their friends of the other sex may join the ladies' club, which does not seem to be so well known as it might be. We may add that the badge of the ladies' club is a particularly attractive one.

These benefits may be described as the purely personal ones; but one of the most attractive features is the Accident Insurance Policy which covers all members, details of which will be found on pages 39 and 40. The premium involved (which is included in the annual subscription) is far less than anything that can be offered

by any British Insurance Company.

Lastly, but not least in importance, all members receive post free a monthly publication, published under the titles of "Die Alpen" or "Les Alpes," which contains articles of mountaineering and scientific interest in both French and German, occasionally in Italian and Romansch—and in English if our members will contribute them. It is beautifully illustrated, and young and ardent lovers of the Alps who want to know more of their beauties, older members who are content to look on them and older still those who live in memories of the past which this monthly review revives, may well think that it is worth the amount of the annual subscription even if the other advantages are no longer or can no longer be made use of.

Members can also get the S.A.C. Publications, includ-

ing guide books, at reduced prices.

# HOW TO JOIN THE SWISS ALPINE CLUB.

It is often thought by candidates that the qualification for membership may be a bar to joining the S.A.C. This is not necessarily the case. Most Sections require only a moderate qualification, guaranteed, however, by the assurance of a member that the candidate has some mountaineering experience. Officials of the Club will always be pleased to render assistance in this matter. The

following is the procedure for anyone who wishes to

join :—

Write to the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. C. T. Lehmann, 28, Monument Street, E.C.3, or to one of the Hon. Secretaries (letters should be marked S.A.C. on the envelope); in this letter the writer should state whether he wishes to join a French, German, or Italian-speaking section.

The entrance form, when filled in, must be returned in all cases to Mr. Lehmann, together with a small photograph, passport size, and the necessary subscription and entrance fee.

For the benefit of those who leave things until the last moment, we would point out that arrangements have been made whereby members of the Geneva, Diablerets, Monte Rosa, Grindelwald and Interlaken Sections (the first three being French-speaking and the last two German-speaking) can be enrolled at this end. This takes a week or ten days if members also join the Association. Normally it takes about two months, as in the case of all other sections it is necessary to communicate with the local Committees.

A list of the principal sections, together with their subscriptions, will be found at the end of this report.

In addition, the subscription to the Association is £1 for Town members and 10s. for Country members. A Country member is defined under the Rules as being a member who resides outside a radius of 50 miles of Charing Cross. There is no entrance fee. Anyone who joins the Association may pay through Mr. Lehmann by remitting him each January the necessary subscription. The Association is willing to arrange for anyone to join the S.A.C., but only continues the remittances to Switzerland for those who join the Association as well. Life membership of the Association costs £8 8s. for Town members and £4 4s. for Country members.

#### CARDS OF MEMBERSHIP OF THE S.A.C.

The Swiss Alpine Club Membership Card (the buff card with the member's photograph inside) is usually issued every three years, but the Central Committee has

decided that the old cards shall continue to be available until further notice, provided the gummed slip for the current year, with the signature of the President of the Central Committee, is affixed to the lower half of the inside cover. It is very necessary for all members to be careful about this.

Instead of the coloured cards issued by the various Sections as receipt for the current year's subscription, membership cards have to be provided with the gummed slip (measuring about  $3\frac{1}{2} \times 1\frac{1}{2}$  inches), bearing the date of year of issue. This gummed slip must be affixed to the inside of the card over the previous slip, and members are earnestly requested to stick it in as soon as they receive it. In the past quite a number of members forgot to do so and only noticed the imperfection of their membership card when about to go to Switzerland, and then hastily appealed for assistance to the Hon. Treasurer, who has not always a stock of these receipt slips, seeing that each Section only sends him as many slips as there are members.

Loss of Membership Card or Badge.—It is inevitable that someone or other should lose his card or badge, and this is most likely to be discovered at holiday times. If such a loss occur, it is best for the member concerned to write direct to his Section Treasurer, as our own officials are quite likely to be away at such a time, and in any case can only refer the matter to Switzerland. To avoid delay a photograph should be sent at the same time if it be the membership card that has been lost. Members of the Geneva, Diablerets and Interlaken Sections, however, can obtain new membership cards and badges straight away from the Hon. Treasurer's office. Price for new membership card is 1/3.

The price of a new badge is 2/6.

#### OFFICERS AND COMMITTEE.

In accordance with the alterations made to Rule 6 earlier in the year, Mr. Gerald Steel, C.B., and Colonel E. R. Culverwell, M.C., were elected Vice-Presidents of the Association. The three existing Vice-Presidents

(Major W. M. Roberts, O.B.E., Mr. C. T. Lehmann and Mr. F. W. Cavey) were elected Honorary Vice-Presidents. Major A. N. Andrews was also elected an Honorary Vice-President.

All the other officers were re-elected.

The following members of the Committee retired, having completed their term of office: Wing Commander E. B. Beauman, Rev. G. H. Lancaster, Mr. A. Guest Mathews and Mr. B. W. Smith. The resulting vacancies were filled by the election of Messrs. Harold Dole (Monte Rosa), H. Norman Fox (Grindelwald), R. A. Tyssen-Gee (Diablerets), and W. S. Webb (Diablerets).

Three casual vacancies were also filled in accordance with the provisions of Rule 9 by the election of Mr. F. H. Slingsby in place of Mr. Gerald Steel, elected Vice-President; Mr. V. O. Cohen in place of Mr. W. B. Johnston, resigned; and Mr. A. C. Butler in place of Air Vice-Marshal A. P. Ledger, resigned. The remaining

members of the Committee were re-elected.

Mr. Victor Umbricht and Mr. George Starkey were re-elected as co-opted members of the Committee, and Mr. Ronald Morrison was co-opted to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Sir Leonard Pearce.

#### **FINANCE**

1947 brought a welcome increase in subscriptions due, of course, to the fact that we could once more go to Switzerland; consequently we have many new members. The subscriptions received for 1947 amount to £279 8s. 5d. as compared with £173 7s. 6d. in 1946.

Life membership is £23 2s. as compared with £16 16s. in 1946. Although in the Accounts this is brought in to Revenue Account, Life Membership strictly speaking is a Capital increase, and as such will be shown in Accounts

in years to come.

Expenses, of course, have also gone up though not in the same proportion, being £238 8s. 6d. as compared

with £208 1s. 9d. in 1946. The item described as "Clubroom expenses" in 1946, viz. £39 17s. 6d. was swolen by a certain amount of Lantern expenses which were being charged at the same time as the hire of the room. It was only later on in the year they were separated and are now shown as two separate items, namely £24 5s. and £23 9s. 10d. a total of £47 14s. 10d. for 1947 as against a comparable figure last year of £46 15s. The cost of the Annual Report is, of course, considerably higher owing to increased membership. The Library expenses appear neavy but, as a matter of fact, include the purchase of a certain number of publications which it was anticipated would sell freely among members, and there are still a number of them available.

The Association has now acquired an Epidiascope at a cost of £86, which will be paid for out of the 1948 accounts. The Epidiascope has actually been on order for seven and a half years. It is a very fine instrument, and will show photographs and picture postcards as well as lantern slides. As a result the item "lantern Expenses" which has figured in our Accounts since 1940 will be a thing of the past, so that the Epidiascope will

pay for itself within five years.

The investments cost us £1,492 2s. 8d., and were

worth at the time of audit some f.1,767.

It is impossible to anticipate what the 1948 figures will be until one knows whether travel to Switzerland will once more be practicable.

# SIR WILLIAM ELLIS TRUST FOR GUIDES OF SWISS NATIONALITY

It is very gratifying to find that in spite of all the monetary restrictions, the Treasury again gave permission for the remittance of pensions allowed to various beneficiaries, and we were able to distribute in May £120 and in November a further £50 among the same as 12st year.

This is the last year we can distribute the fiso in

November, and unfortunately a substantial part of the Funds were in Railway debentures, and there will consequently be a small reduction in the income to be distributed to the beneficiaries next year.

The Trustees still continue to receive grateful letters. of thanks from the recipients of these pensions.

Any member who wishes to borrow a book from the Library is requested to enter his name in the book provided for that purpose, and not to keep the book so borrowed for more than one month. The Postal Service will be restored as soon as possible.


A Ladies' Night Dinner will be held at the Connaught Rooms on Wednesday, May 26th, and further details will

# **O**bituary

# SIR LEONARD PEARCE, C.B.E. 1873-1947.

Sir Standen Leonard Pearce was born at Crewkerne in 1873 and died in 1947. He was educated at Bishops Stortford College and the Finsbury Technical College, and became one of the nation's leading experts in electrical supply. In 1925 he became one of the Electricity Commissioners. The great achievement of his life was in connection with the Battersea Power Station, as he was the designer of the engineering set-out of that world-famous building. He was knighted in 1935.

To us he was known as an enthusiastic and energetic mountaineer. His section was Diablerets: he was one of our original members in 1909 and, of course, a

" Veteran "."

In his younger days he was a great athlete, and his special love on the mountains was long ridges. He was a ski-er as well as a climber, and in one great exploit he combined both these sports in his celebrated ascent, with his daughter, of the Mönch in 1938, as early in the year as February, a great achievement and at the time unique.

He served a period as President of the Alpine Ski Club, and he was a co-opted member of our Committee. He was offered the Presidency of the Association in 1939, but he was too modest to accept it. We shall miss his keenness and friendliness very much, for, busy as his life was, he found time to attend our meetings frequently.

#### MONSIEUR C. R. PARAVICINI.

1872-1947.

The Association has lost this year one of its best-known Honorary members, Monsieur C. R. Paravicini, who was

elected in 1920.

He was born at Basle in 1872 of one of the old Italian families settled in that town, and entered the Diplomatic Service in 1900 and was straight away posted as an attaché to the London Legation Staff. After four years in London he was transferred to Paris, later on to St. Petersburg, then back again to London where Monsieur Carlin was at that time Minister, and who may be remembered by some of our original members.

In 1917, Monsieur Paravicini went back to Bern, and ultimately in 1920 returned to London and this time

as Minister.

From the first year that he was here he interested himself in our Association, and throughout his long career never missed an opportunity either of attending our dinners or, if unavoidably prevented, of securing an efficient substitute from the Legation Staff. Both he and his wife endeared themselves greatly to the Swiss Societies in London, and the social side of their activities was cultivated to a much higher degree than had been done by his predecessors. Madame Paravicini made an ideal partner to one whose urbanity and courtesy placed him in the forefront of the Diplomatic Corps in London. We very much regretted the retirement from office in 1940 of Monsieur Paravicini who was then able to settle down in his beloved country first at Bern then at that charming little lakeside village of Oberhofen on the Lake of Thun where he passed away on November 15th.

A memorial service was held at the Swiss Church in London on Saturday, November 18th, attended not only by the Legation Staff but by a large number of members of the various Swiss societies, including our own.

## THE AROLLA MEET, 1947.

The first Summer Meet of the Association, held at the Hotel Mont Collon, Arolla, from July 23rd to August 6th, was blessed with all three, and since the remaining necessity—good companionship—was also very evident, it follows that the innovation was a successful one. So much so that ideas are already incubating for a repetition of the experiment this summer, subject of course to the chains which bind us to our island fortress (or slave state as one prominent member will have it) being knocked off in time.

For many of us it was the first sight of the snows of Switzerland for ten years, or thereabouts, and the effects of an abnormally snow-free winter followed by an excessively dry summer were very evident. Schwartzhorn and Dent Noire would have been more appropriate names than Weisshorn and Dent Blanche, and the normally glistening white snow cap of the Pigne d'Arolla had a strangely shrunken and shop-worn appearance.

The brilliant summer had other and more dangerous effects, some of which our party were to experience, as will be indicated later. Where in normal years easy snow slopes lead up to the summits ice now barred the way, and bare rock, loose and crumbling, exposed itself in

countless unexpected places.

On the whole our party was, like the young lady in the song, poor but (relatively) honest. We varied from the dire economic straits of the President, snatching a week with us on the small change left over from a holiday in Sweden, to the comparative opulence of a few who had carefully arranged for the presence of non-climbing relations to add Swiss francs to the till.

The problem of guides was therefore a real one. We solved it by engaging Franz Biner, an old and well-tried

climbing companion of Dr. Finzi's, and, with three experienced leaders in Culverwell, Starkey and Greg, we were able on two occasions to arrange for four parties

to be together on the same mountain.

In this way we accomplished the ascents of the Mont Collon and the traverse of the Mont Blanc de Seilon. Other climbs, made by smaller parties, included Les Rousettes (by the East Ridge), Petite Dent de Veisivi, Pigne d'Arolla, Dent Blanche, l'Evêque, Aiguilles Rouges, Douves Blanches and the Dent d'Herens (the last three falling to the superabundant energy of W. B. Johnston).

Lack of space prohibits any detailed description of these climbs, though on June 23rd those interested will be able to hear more about them. Let it suffice to say of the traverse of the Mont Blanc de Seilon, made from the Val des Dix hut, that it provided a most enjoyable climb for twelve of our members, including rock, snow and some ice work, accomplished according to plan.

The ascent of the Mont Collon by the ordinary route from the new, sensationally sited and somewhat overpopulated hut on the Col des Vignettes was, however, not entirely without incident, and although technically the climb was easy, the writer feels that he was probably not alone in feeling very relieved to be safely off the mountain.

One section of the rock face by which the ascent was made was in sober fact just a very steep dusty rubble-heap. It was a place where, as usual, parties lower down the mountain take a very poor view of the foot work of those climbing above them. But mild vituperation, even on a mountain, does little harm and, in time, all four parties reached the summit.

On the descent the ice slope above the rocks provided the entertaining spectacle of one rope of three climbers (two orthodox in boots, and the other, having discarded his Vibrams in disgust, heterodox in stockings) with no axes, searching Agag-like for the steps which led to the

imagined safety of the rocks.

Lower down, another party had the alarming experience of hearing and seeing immediately above them an enormous mass of rock slowly and inevitably breaking away from the mountain. Their wild dash, in a cloud of dust and stones, down and across the treacherous rock to safety provided another vivid impression, made still more vivid a minute later by the thunderous roar of the rock as it hurtled past to final silence, leaving a slowly billowing cloud to mark its passage.

The descent of the remaining two parties was conducted at a more sober pace, so much so that after negotiating the crevasses of the Pièce glacier by lantern and/or moonlight, they finally reached the hotel at midnight.

Some reference must now be made to the social aspects of the holiday. The high spot here was the Dinner held on July 26th, not, like the Meet itself, an innovation,

but an institution sanctified by time.

Thanks to M. Anzevui of the Hotel Mont Collon, the dinner—in the narrowest sense of the term—pleased everybody and, mainly thanks to our colleagues in the Climbers' Club who were also attending a meet at Arolla, our numbers—which we feared might be fewer than usual—reached the gratifying total of thirty-five. Dr. Charles de Kalbermatten, President of the Monte Rosa Section and an ex-President of the Central Committee, was the guest of honour, and Culverwell showed that he is a cabaret star manqué with an up-to-date rendering in French of the old theme that love makes the world go round. Incidentally our President proved that his stamina among the comparatively fleshly pots of Switzerland was no less than on the peaks, and rumour has it that the Swiss and English Presidents, as was fitting, were the last to climb up to their beds that night.

The morning after was devoted to another ascent, though it was, mercifully, no higher than to the Hotel Kurhaus in the woods above our hotel. Here we were entertained to apéritifs by the Committee of the Monte Rosa Section who had just returned from an inspection of their huts.

Our Swiss friends delighted us also with numerous Valaisian part songs, sung with much feeling and mellow tone, and some of us felt bound to return the compliment

in kind. What the Monte Rosa Section made of our version of "Ilkla Moor Baht 'At" we shall never know—even some of our own party looked rather perplexed, but Culverwell, not to be put off by lack of footlights, restored our national prestige by an al fresco rendering of his now well-known ditty.

This account would be incomplete without noting the names of all those members and friends who attended. The following were present for at least one of the two weeks: Dr. N. S. Finzi, Colonel Culverwell and Mrs. E. R. Culverwell, Mr. and Mrs. George Starkey, Mr. and Mrs. F. H. Slingsby, Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Joly, Mrs. Johnston, Miss R. Crawford, Miss P. Shirley and Messrs. T. W. D. Baird, A. C. Butler, J. E. L. Clements, F. R. Crepin, R. L. Greg, A. H. Henson and W. B. Johnston.

In conclusion tribute should be paid to those mentioned earlier as leaders of ropes, and in particular to George Starkey whose knowledge of the district was invaluable. Grateful thanks are also due to H. St. V. Longley-Cook who, although he was not with us, had in co-operation with Starkey produced, in the for our meet, a most

useful climbing guide to Arolla.

### THE BRITISH MOUNTAINEERING COUNCIL

The B.M.C. has just completed the first three years of its existence, and with the end of the third year comes the end of the term of office of its first President, Mr. Geoffrey Winthrop Young. It is, of course, impossible to rate too highly the services which he has rendered to the B.M.C., and it is therefore with a sense of loss that his retirement from the Presidential chair is recorded. The Council is, however, fortunate in the appointment of Mr. A. S. Piggott as its new President.

It is also unfortunately necessary to record the loss of the Council's Honorary Secretary, John Barford, through an accident in the Dauphiné Alps. It is difficult to give a picture of the extreme energy and devotion which Barford brought to the service of the B.M.C., but to say that this energy and devotion constituted a major factor in constructing the foundations of the Council and its present position is merely to set forth a plain and inescapable truth.

The activities of the Council during the past year have in the main followed the lines of previous years, and the following are short notes on what has transpired.

#### National Parks, etc.

The Council has continued its representation on the Standing Committee on National Parks of the Council for the Preservation of Rural England, and has submitted its opinion on points arising out of the Hobhouse report and the Report on Footpaths and Access to the Countryside.

In one or two cases it has either protested or lent its support to protests against the use of land by Service Departments and others. The recent White Paper on National Parks in Scotland is under active consideration, particularly by the Scottish Committee.

### Climbing in Britain.

This book has sold extremely well, and a second edition was issued during the year. So far some 62,000 copies have been sold, resulting in a payment of about £125 to the Council in royalties.

## The Central Council for Physical Recreation.

Co-operation with this body has continued with great success. Two climbing meets were held in North Wales, together with a series of week-end courses for beginners in Derbyshire. These courses were run by A. W. Bridge, a member of the Peak District Committee.

In addition a series of mountain training courses were held in Scotland at Glenmore Lodge at which Lord Malcolm Douglas-Hamilton and other well-known mountaineers acted as instructors.

Relations with many other bodies have been continued and developed with special reference to the Youth Hostels Association, the Boy Scouts' Association, and the Ramblers' Association.

#### Mountain Rescue Scheme.

The name of the First-Aid Committee has been changed to Mountain Rescue Committee, and further equipment and rescue posts have been provided in Scotland and in the Peak District. The Committee is still urgently in need of financial support for the maintenance and extension of its activities, and it is hoped that this will be forthcoming.

#### Prevention of Accidents.

In collaboration with the Ramblers' Association it has been decided to produce a leaflet on hill sense in an attempt to reduce the number of accidents in mountain areas, and the help of the Royal Society for Prevention of Accidents has been sought in the matter.

#### Huts and Bivouacs.

A large majority of clubs having approved the proposals to establish a Central Hut Fund and to launch it as a

War Memorial appeal, a scheme has been worked out by the Huts sub-committee and approved by the Central Committee. Copies of an appeal for funds and rules for the management of the fund are in the press and will shortly be distributed.

### Journal.

The roneoed news bulletin has been discontinued, and a quarterly journal "Mountaineering" has taken its place. Circulation of this is rising, but a large number of extra subscribers is needed to make the venture a financial success. The subscription is 55. per annum, and orders should be sent to the Treasurer, "Mountaineering," 148, Sussex Gardens, W.2.

### Rope and Equipment.

A large number of natural fibre and nylon ropes and rope techniques have been tested and two reports, (a) "An interim report on Rope" and (b) "Natural Fibre Rope for Use in Mountaineering" have been issued.

Work is also in progress on the use of moulded rubber soles (Vibram), the design of boot nails, the strength and design of snap rings and the use of nylon rope.

## Professional Guides.

The scheme for registering and testing professional guides in this country is now in full operation. Certificates have been issued to six rock climbing guides (five in the Lakes and one in North Wales) and two mountain guides (one in the Lakes and one in North Wales).

#### Financial.

The B.M.C. has now reached the point at which its income is not sufficient to support its activities, and the problem which now confronts the council is that of finding a method of increasing its income which will be satisfactory to clubs large and small alike.

#### THE ANGLO-SWISS SOCIETY.

In December, 1947, the Anglo-Swiss Society was founded in London for the purpose of maintaining and developing the existing friendship between the British and Swiss peoples, to foster a closer unity to the mutual advantage of the two nations and to promote social and cultural relations between Great Britain and Switzerland. The activities of the Society are entirely social and cultural; they are strictly non-political.

The Society functions by means of Receptions, Luncheons and Dinners in celebration of special occasions, in honour of distinguished guests and in order to provide regular opportunities for the members to meet. It is proposed also to arrange other activities, such as Exhibitions, Films, Lectures and Discussions on art, literature, commerce, science, discovery, travel and social life

in Switzerland.

Members receive invitations to all the functions of the Society, and may bring their friends. They also receive a copy of the journal containing the Society's Proceedings. It is proposed to publish this in the form of a magazine in 1948.

The subscription will be £1 per annum.

The Right Hon. Noel Baker, M.P., is President, and a strong Council is being formed which includes notable personalities from the political, diplomatic and scientific world.

#### CLUB NOTES.

After the bright hopes of 1946 the past year has been one of disappointment and disillusionment. The restrictions of the previous year far from being relaxed were intensified. On June 1st, without any warning whatsoever, the Swiss Authorities reduced the amount of money which English visitors might spend in Switzerland from £75 to £50. This was a very severe blow to many of our members as they had already made their holiday plans. If it was necessary for the Swiss Authorities to take this step, one cannot help wondering why they did not announce their intention of doing so in the Spring—BEFORE people had started making their holiday plans; the resulting hardship would then not have been so great. It is true that some of our members managed to convince the Swiss Authorities in London that £50 would not be sufficient for their needs, while a fewwho had been unsuccessful in London-managed to convince the authorities in Zurich; but the fact remains that many were forced either to curtail their holiday or to cut down their climbing and to forego expeditions which perhaps they might have been dreaming of ever since 1938. In any case one does not associate "fiddling" or "wangling" with a Swiss holiday, and the idea of having to resort to tactics of this nature must surely be distasteful to all true lovers of the mountains. members wondered why the Central Committee of the Swiss Alpine Club did not intervene, but doubtless there were reasons why they could not do so. The operation of the Voucher System was less troublesome than most people feared, though it varied from place to place; but it was a nuisance all the same.

The Travel Ban has so far not affected our members, though it has been a cruel blow to Winter Sports enthusiasts; one can only hope that it will be lifted before the Summer. There have been reports that it may be

lifted to the extent of allowing travellers to take £35 out of the country with them instead of £75, and if this is the case the holding of a Club Meet will be more necessary than ever as individual climbing with guides is quite out of the question on an allowance of £35

except for a very short period.

The weather in the Alps in 1947 from about July 20th onwards was, except for a few short breaks, quite exceptional, and the heat was phenomenal. Naturally a lot of very good climbing was done, but the year had its drawbacks. As a result of the great heat many peaks which would normally be at least partially covered in snow were quite bare, and rock falls were frequent and dangerous conditions prevailed in many places. In consequence the death roll was much heavier than usual, and several very experienced climbers were killed. One of our own members (Mr. H. E. Kretschmer) was killed on the Brenva Ridge with Mr. J. R. Jenkins, and Mr. J. E. Q. Barford (the Secretary of the British Mountaineering Council) was killed in the Dauphiné. Mr. Jenkins and Mr. Barford were both former members of the Association. All three of them were very experienced climbers, and they will be a grievous loss to the mountaineering world. As usual several of the accidents which occurred were due to inexperience, but one cannot help wondering whether some of them might not have been avoided if the victims had had sufficient Swiss currency to engage guides.

The prospects for 1948 are none too good, and it is impossible to foretell what may happen during the next

six months. One can only hope for the best.

The Association has had another most successful year. It was again possible to arrange a most interesting series of papers, details of which will be found on another page. Once again we should like to express to the Alpine Club our great appreciation of their kindness in allowing us to hold our meetings in such attractive surroundings.

In addition to the ordinary meetings a formal Ladies' Night Dinner (the first since 1939) was held at the Chez Auguste Restaurant, Soho, on May 21st, at which Dr. C. F. Fothergill showed some superb coloured lantern slides of Alpine Scenery and Peasant Life; ninety members and guests were present. The Annual Dinner, of which details are given on another page, would have been even larger than last year if it had not been for the Government restrictions. Last, but not least, we have had a record number of new members—no less than 165 having joined during the past year. If the travel ban is lifted there is every likelihood that the progress of the last two years will be maintained.

We nave lost nine members and one honorary member through death during the past year.—Canon G. M. Bell, Mr. A. Greaves, Major M. B. Heywood, Mr. W. S. Jackson, Mr. H. E. Kretschmer (who was killed on the Brenva Ridge on August 8th), Sir Leonard Pearce, Mr. S. B. Peech, Mr. Legh S. Powell and Mr. William Tattersall; also Monsieur C. R. Paravicini, who was Swiss Minister in London from 1920 to 1940. They will be sadly missed by all who knew them. Obituary notices of Sir Leonard Pearce and Monsieur C. R. Paravicini will be found on another page.

The Easter Meet was held at the Old Dungeon Ghyll Hotel, Langdale, where we were made most comfortable by our old friends, Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Bulman. It was the largest Meet we have had since 1939, but unfortunately the weather was far from kind to us—and the arrival of the fine spell on the morning we left was just adding insult to injury. Nevertheless, a number of good excursions were made.

The Meet was attended by Colonel and Mrs. E. R. Culverwell, Mr. and Mrs. C. G. Markbreiter, Mr. and

Mrs. George Starkey, Lieut.-Colonel A. E. Tydeman, Major W. M. Roberts, Captain R. L. Greg, Dr. J. W. Healy and Messrs. E. L. Theobald, R. S. Dadson, A. R. A. Seacome, A. A. Galloway, R. A. Tyssen Gee, M. N. Clarke and F. R. Crepin. Mr. and Mrs. R. P. Mears were prevented from coming at the last moment owing to illness.

The 1948 Easter Meet will be held at the Corrie Hotel, Isle of Arran, from March 24th to March 30th.

Evening Meetings were held at the Alpine Club in January, February, March, April, June, September and October, and the following papers were read, all of which were illustrated by lantern slides:—

We are very much indebted to these members for making these meetings such a success.

The Hon. Librarian is glad to state that the Library has now been brought back to London and been accommodated in a room placed at the disposal of the Association through the kindness of Mr. C. T. Lehmann at 28, Monument Street, E.C.3. Although a large part of the books spent several years in a coal mine, most of them are in excellent condition.

The Hon. Librarian desires to acknowledge with thanks gifts of books by Mr. Walter Sedgwick: "Mountains and Lakes of Switzerland and Italy," by Rev. Jerome J. Mercier (published in 1871), and a publication by the "Studio" about fifteen years ago on Swiss Art.

Our thanks are also due to Mrs. Enid Forrester (Sir Leonard Pearce's daughter), for sending us a number of

her father's maps.

The Library can now be used by members (on presentation of their S.A.C. membership cards) on weekdays from Monday to Friday between 10.30 a.m. and 4.30 p.m. A book will be kept in which members are asked to enter the names of the books borrowed and the dates on which they are taken out and returned. Out of consideration for other members no book should be kept for more than one month.

Some years before the war the Association published "The Technique of Alpine Mountaineering," which was a translation of a little handbook issued by the Uto Section of the S.A.C. Since it went out of print in 1940 there have been numerous demands for it both from this country and America. Last year the question was considered of bringing out a second edition, but the Committee decided that it would be more satisfactory to bring out instead a translation of the "Manuel d'Alpinisme"—an excellent and very practical handbook on climbing which was published by the Central Committee of the S.A.C. in 1943. This is now in the course of preparation, and it is hoped that it will be ready by the end of July.

Although the Association has held Easter Meets in Great Britain ever since 1931, it has never previously attempted a Meet in Switzerland. The question was often considered before the war, but it was felt that sufficient support would not be forthcoming. In 1947, however, it was felt that conditions had changed and that an Association Meet should be held in the Alps. Accordingly a Meet was organised at Arolla from July 23rd to August 6th, and a detailed account of it will be found elsewhere in the Report. It is sufficient to say here that the Meet was such a success that it has been decided to make it an annual event in future. Even if the existing travel ban is lifted the probable reduction of the currency allowance from £75 to £35 makes the holding of a Club Meet more necessary than ever, as individual climbing with guides is for the time being practically out of the question except for a very short holiday. If conditions permit the 1948 Swiss Meet will be held at Zinal from (probably) July 21st to August 4th, and the Annual Swiss Dinner (which was revived last year) will again be combined with the Meet. Full details of course will be circulated later. If it is not possible to get out to Switzerland, alternative plans will be considered.

In view of the large number of members who live in Scotland and the north of England and are therefore unable to attend the ordinary meetings of the Association, the Committee are trying to work out a scheme for providing similar amenities for those members either by the formation of a Northern Section or by the appointment of local representatives who could establish relations with the local climbing clubs. Any suggestions as to the best method of achieving this object would be very cordially welcomed by the Committee.

We should like to extend our deepest sympathy to the victims of the explosion at Blausee on December 20th. It is a tragedy that such a beautiful spot should be devastated in this manner. It was feared at one time that some of the Kandersteg guides, who were employed there, had been killed or injured, but happily this was not so. Fortunately the explosion occurred in the early hours of the morning with the result that although the material damage was very serious the death roll was mercifully small.

We should like to take this opportunity of expressing our appreciation of the hospitality which has been extended to us by our friends of the Ladies' Alpine Club during the past year, and were very pleased to be able to welcome their President to our Annual Dinner at the Connaught Rooms on November 26th. We need hardly add that if they would care to come to any of our evening meetings we shall be delighted to see them.

The Annual Dinner was held at the Connaught Rooms on Wednesday, November 26th, and—but for the new Government restrictions—would have been even larger than last year. The President was in the Chair, and 100 Members and Guests were present.

The Guests of the Association were Monsieur Escher, who represented the Swiss Legation in the absence of the Swiss Minister who was prevented from attending at the last moment; Dr. T. G. Longstaff, President of the Alpine Club; Mr. L. W. Somervell, President of the Fell and Rock Climbing Club; Mrs. Standring, President of the Ladies' Alpine Club; and Mr. K. Berrill, President of the Cambridge University Mountaineering Club.

Professor G. R. de Beer proposed the toast of "The Swiss Confederation" to which Monsieur Escher replied. The President then proposed the toast of "The Association," and in doing so gave a résumé of the activities of the Association during the past year. Then Colonel Culverwell proposed the toast of "The Guests and Kindred Clubs" which was responded to by Mr. L. W. Somervell. Finally Mr. M. N. Clarke proposed the health of the President who, in his reply, proposed the health of the Secretaries and Treasurer, and that concluded the proceedings.

## SUMMER HOLIDAYS, 1948.

The Hon. Secretaries will be very glad to hear from any members who wish for help in making up parties for the Alps or elsewhere. It is not possible for the Association officials to organise parties, but they are quite prepared to put members in touch with one another when they can, and this has often been done in the past. The monthly dinners for those who can attend them are, of course, an admirable opportunity for making summer arrangements, and if members who are short of climbing companions will acquaint the Secretaries beforehand, something can often be done by way of introductions at one of the dinners.

It is desirable that communications on this subject should be sent early, not later than the first half of July, as the Secretaries may themselves be away. It is hoped that beginners in particular will avail themselves of the help of the Association in any matters connected with holiday plans which members are advised to make much earlier than they did before the war; we have often been able in the past to give advice about guides or districts to enquirers and to suggest plans.

If the Travel Ban is lifted it is proposed to hold a Climbing Meet in Switzerland this summer in connection with the Annual Swiss Dinner. If, on the other hand, it is impossible to get abroad this year a Meet will probably be organised in North Wales or the Lake District. The details will be announced in due course.

The attention of members is drawn to the numerous excursions and climbs which are arranged by all the Sections of the S.A.C., and which afford an opportunity of some extraordinary good climbs at a very moderate cost. Although perhaps it is preferable to climb with one's own Section, one can always join a climb of another Section—and, further, one can always be assured of a very hearty welcome. For those who want to cut down

expenses these Section Climbs should prove invaluable. Further details may be obtained from the Hon. Treasurer.

SUNDAY WALKS.—If members are desirous of arranging a training walk at any time, the Hon. Secretaries will always be very glad to put them in touch with others similarly inclined, whenever possible. Such members should communicate with one of the Hon. Secretaries not later than the previous Wednesday. A Club Walk will be arranged on one Sunday a month if there is sufficient demand for it.

#### INSURANCE AGAINST ACCIDENTS.

It is anticipated that the Swiss Alpine Club will renew their contract with the Swiss Insurance Companies for three years from January 1st, 1948, on substantially the same terms as before, but the precise details have not yet come to hand. The sum assured varies according to the sections. With some it is 10,000 francs, with others 8,000 francs, payable at death, or proportionately for permanent disablement. In 1943 the standard premium was raised by one franc in order to cover the cost of the increased liability due to guides now being insured on the same terms as members.

The Insurance covers accidents in the Central European Alps, the Jura, Pyrenees, Apennines, Carpathians, Vosges, Black Forest, England, Scotland and Wales, but it does not cover Norway, Himalayas, etc.

The terms of the policy of insurance take effect in favour of members "au moment ils out acquis la qualité de membre." It is possible that, strictly speaking, this may mean the date when the candidate is actually elected a member. For the convenience of would-be members the Honorary Treasurer issues membership cards at short notice and before the candidature has been ratified by election at a meeting of the particular section.

The Insurance Company has not denied liability in respect of accidents occurring between the date of issue of the membership card and the date of actual election, and it is not expected that they would do so in future. To be on the safe side, however, members should allow sufficient time (normally seven to eight weeks) for their candidature to be ratified by the particular section before proceeding to the Alps. Neither the Association nor the Honorary Treasurer can accept any responsibility should the Insurance Company take the above-mentioned point in any individual case.

The benefit of the insurance can now only be paid to wife and children, grandchildren, parents, and brothers or sisters, and the benefits cannot be assigned to, or claimed by, any other parties.

Additional policies can be obtained:

- (a) For payment of 3 francs, to bring up the insurance for death or permanent disablement from 8,000 to 10,000 francs for climbing accidents only.
- (b) 3 francs to secure the same benefits as above for ski accidents.

It should be noted that ski accidents in the first place do not cover jumping, or accidents occurring while the insured is taking part in any sporting event, and that the accident must be part of a genuine ski run, i.e. when skis are used as a means of transport in what may be considered a mountaineering expedition.

Additional premiums of:

8.20 francs will cover 3 francs daily during temporary disablement, starting from the eighth day and up to one year, but the amount will depend on the degree of disablement and not exceed 3 francs.

9.40 francs will cover medical expenses up to 3 francs per day, limited to 300 francs.

14.60 francs will cover medical expenses and a daily allowance on the above scales.

There may be various combinations of the above, or even doubling or trebling of one particular form of insurance.

In no case are expenses of a rescue party or transport covered by insurance.

Neither the Association nor individual members can accept any liability for the above brief particulars of insurance. For full terms of the contract of insurance members should also refer to "Les Alpes".

The exact reference can, if required, be obtained from the Honorary Treasurer.

# RULES

### 1. NAME.

The name of the Association shall be "The Association of Beitish Members of the Swiss Alpine Club,"

### OBJECTS.

The objects of the Association shall be :-

- (a) To encourage British Alpinists to support the Swiss Alpine Club in all its work by becoming members of a Section of that body.
- (b) To collect funds for the building or maintenance of S.A.C. Huts, and for such other purposes as the Committee may from time to time determine.
- (c) To form a body able to present a collective opinion to the S.A.C. on any question of Alpine interest.
- (d) To promote among British climbers a spirit of sociability, and in particular to provide a common meeting ground in London or elsewhere.
- (e) To initiate and co-operate in any movement that may tend to increase the membership of the S.A.C. and of this Association.

### 3. CONSTITUTION.

The Association shall consist of (1) Ordinary Members and

(2) Honorary Members.

Ordinary Members shall be divided into two classes (a) Town and (b) Country. Town Members shall be those who reside within a radius of 50 miles of Charing Cross. Country Members shall be those who reside outside that radius.

The qualification for ordinary membership shall be membership of some section of the S.A.C. The election of Ordinary Members shall be absolutely under the control of the Committee. Honorary Members shall be elected by the Committee at their discretion.

### 4. SUBSCRIPTION.

The subscription to the Association shall be £1 per annum for Town Members and 10/- per annum for Country Members, the first subscription to be payable at election and subsequent subscriptions on the 1st January in each year. Any Member whose subscription shall not have been paid on or before the 1st March shall cease to be a Member of the Association, but may be reinstated on payment of arrears at the discretion of the Committee. Any Member joining after the 1st November shall not be required to pay his subscription for the ensuing year.

The payment of £8 8s. 0d. in the case of Town Members and £4 4s. 0d. in the case of Country Members shall constitute

Life Membership.

For those elected BEFORE 1921 it shall be optional whether they pay 5/-, 10/- or £1 subscription, or £2 2s. 0d., £4 4s. 0d. or £8 8s. 0d. for Life Membership. For those elected AFTER 31st December, 1920, but BEFORE the 1st of January, 1930, it shall be optional whether they pay 10/- or £1 subscription or £4 4s. 0d. or £8 8s. 0d. for Life Membership.

### 5. MEETINGS.

(a) An Annual General Meeting and Dinner shall be held in November or December. Other meetings may be held as the Committee think fit.

(b) The Committee, on the requisition of twelve members, shall at any time call a Special General Meeting, provided that seven clear days' notice be given to all Members of such a Special General Meeting, together with full information as to the place, time, and business to be transacted.

#### 6. COMMITTEE.

The Management of the Association shall be vested in a Committee to be elected at the Annual General Meeting and to hold office for one year from the 1st Jahuary following. The committee shall Consist of ex-officio members, Ordinary Members, and such extra Members, not exceeding three, as may be coopted in the manner hereinafter provided.

(a) The ex-officio Members shall be the officers of the Association

for the time being, viz.:

President,

Two Elective Vice-Presidents,

Honorary Vice-Presidents,

Two Hon. Secretaries,

Hon. Treasurer,

Hon, Librarian.

Hon. Solicitor;

who shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting, provided that neither the President nor any Elective Vice-President shall serve as such for longer than three years in succession. (b) The Ordinary Members of the Committee shall be twelve in number. One-third of them shall retire annually, and shall not be eligible for re-election until after one year has elapsed. The Committee may co-opt not more than three additional Members, one of whom must retire yearly; the mode of election and manner of retirement to rest with the Committee. Five Members shall constitute a quorum. The Committee may suggest names for Officers and Committee, but this is not to be taken as precluding any two Members from nominating candidates, whose consent, however, must be previously obtained.

At least three weeks' notice of the Annual Meeting shall be given to every Member; and nominations for Officers and Committee must be sent in to the Secretaries at least ten days before the Annual Meeting. In the event of more candidates being nominated than there are vacancies the election shall be by ballot.

### 7. POWERS OF THE COMMITTEE.

(a) The Committee may, by a two-thirds majority of those present, remove the name of any Member from the list of Members if they consider his conduct to be incompatible with membership of the Association; but such person shall have the right of appeal to the next Annual or Special General Meeting, which shall have the power of annulling, by a two-thirds majority of those present and voting, the decision of the Committee.

(b) The Committee shall have power to submit any proposal affecting the Association to an Annual or Special General

Meeting of the Members of the Association.

(c) The Committee shall have power to increase the number of Officers by two.

### 8. ACCOUNTS.

The Accounts of the Association shall be audited in January and presented by the Hon. Treasurer at the next General Meeting of the Association, and shall be published with the Annual Report.

### 9. CASUAL VACANCIES.

The Committee shall have power to fill up casual vacancies amongst the Officers or Committee; and those chosen shall serve for the unexpired period of office for which the Members whom they succeed were respectively elected.

### 10. ROOM FOR MEETINGS AND LIBRARY.

The Committee shall have power to hire premises for the purposes of the Association.

### 11. PUBLICATIONS.

The Committee shall have power to publish an Annual Report and other publications.

### 12. ALTERATIONS OF RULES.

A General Meeting shall have power, by a majority of not less than two-thirds of the Members present and voting, to alter or add to the existing Rules of the Association.

### 13. REGULATIONS.

The Committee shall have power to make such regulations, not being inconsistent with these Rules, as they think to be for the well-being of the Association.

### 14. THE CHAIRMAN.

The Chair, whether at a General Meeting or at a Meeting of the Committee, shall be taken by the President of the Association, or in his absence by one of the Vice-Presidents, or failing them by one of the Honorary Vice-Presidents. In the absence of the President, Vice-Presidents, and Honorary Vice-Presidents, the Meeting shall elect a Chairman from among the Members present. The Chairman shall, in case of an equality of votes, have a second or casting vote.

### 15, RETIRED LIFE MEMBERS.

Life Members of the Association who have ceased to be Members of the Swiss Alpine Club may enjoy the privileges of the Association except that they shall not be eligible to fill any office of the Association or to serve on the Committee or to vote at any of the meetings.
